

If it's not yours, don't take it.


If it's not true, don't say it.

A recent report by Transparency International rated countries around the world on the level of

corruption. Neighboring Botswana ranked higher than much of Europe. I will not comment on Zimbabwe or the USA. In her Intensive English classes, Jane sometimes has interesting discussions about various topics, including corruption. It is obvious that students' perceptions are VERY different.



For example, a student from D.R.C. (Congo) was telling me about stores near the border-posts that sell 'road-block rolls' which are considered essential for getting through the numerous traffic stops by army and police. When I asked whether that is not corruption, he said, "But sir, the soldiers are very poorly paid-How else can they survive?"

One of the required courses for all undergraduates at Africa University is Ethics (*Theology 200*). One of my second-year students was telling me how much he learned from the teacher, Rev Bondo, an AU graduate and Jane's former student. He told me, 'Even a person who is a liar would be convinced to change his ways after taking the class.'

Africa University recently celebrated its 25th Anniversary, with over 6 000 graduates. Many are now making a difference in leadership positions in many different countries. Their training here at AU gave them solid foundations in not only their major area of expertise, but also in deciding what is right.


